Caritas Receives \$773,700 Senior Community Service Employment Program Grant

Caritas Family Solutions has been awarded a \$773,700 grant from the Center for Workforce Inclusion, Inc. (the Center). Almost 90 percent of this grant -originally from the U.S. Department of Labor - will provide temporary employment to no less than 106 low-income older Illinoisans living in Bond, Clinton, Fayette, Greene, Jersey, Macoupin, Madison, Marion, Montgomery, Scott, and St. Clair.

These older adults will participate in the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) a cornerstone program of the Older Americans Act. SCSEP is celebrating its 55th anniversary this year.

SCSEP, the only federal job training program targeted exclusively to low income seniors, promotes personal dignity and selfsufficiency through work. Its' temporary parttime community service jobs provide a handup, not a hand-out for older, unemployed low-income Americans. The Senior Community Service Employment Program allows eligible persons to participate for up to four years, but the average tenure nationally is 19 months with the experience and training they receive leading them to permanent employment.

As one of the largest U.S. Department of Labor National Grantees of SCSEP, the Center works through a network of local partners delivering various career training programs for eligible 55-plus-year-old workers in 33 states. To date, the Center has placed over 90,000 older workers into permanent employment through the SCSEP program. "Our long-term, local partners are a key to the strength of the Center and provide the systems to train older Americans into strategic advantage for employers and the Country." said Gary A. Officer, Center for Workforce Inclusion President and CEO. "We are very pleased to continue our support of the Caritas Family Solutions for the 46th consecutive

"SCSEP has been a god send during the COVID-19 pandemic," said Gary Huelsmann, Caritas Family Solutions, CEO. "SCSEP participants have been able to continue to be paid emergency pandemic sick leave while they stay at home and in many cases continue to receive training."

Continuing to receive funds has prevented participants from becoming homeless. And now, the participants are slowly starting to be able to safely return to their training sites where they help local community, faithbased, and public agencies carry out their

Huelsmann concluded, "SCSEP is providing hope and the dignity of work to low income 55+ who are not job ready and have the toughest employment challenges. The grant from the Center is vital to our being able to deliver this program in the communities we serve."

Caritas SCSEP provides Computer Tablet Training for Participants



Caritas SCSEP realizes that a majority of our participants have very limited computer skills, which makes employment seeking very difficult. Today, more and more companies require applications and resumes be submitted through an on-line

Recognizing this dilemma, through a grant from National Association of Nutrition and Aging Services Programs (NANASP), for supportive services, training, etc., we developed the CTT4S (Computer Tablet Training 4 Seniors) program, designed to teach basic computer skills to assist them with their efforts to rejoin the workforce. Along with this training, each SCSEP participant has received a computer tablet to assist them with their job searches, time sheets, and career exploration.

The Veterans Court Technology Clinic Inc., (VCTC) is a 501(C)(3) organization that has been contracted to instruct our Caritas/SCSEP participants, under the CTT4S program. "The workplace today is 95% computerized, and no matter where you find employment there is a good chance a computer or tablet will be a basic tool you will use," says Kennedy Davis, Founder and Executive Director of VCTC. In the past six years, VCTC has helped over 750 people gain marketable competence in computer skills, including office software usage and hardware maintenance, and prepared them for employment, self-employment, or higher education.
