It is the collective contributions of all citizens that make the U.S. the best place to live, work and raise a family. Let's not just remember the past...

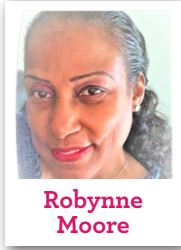

An Employment Program That Helps Seniors Get Into the Workforce



Robynne Moore was a retired office administrator who decided to rejoin the job force after the age of 55. Now she has found a way to work, thanks to a senior work program.

Moore was referred to a senior training program which taught her

new skills such as working with Microsoft Office, along with refreshing her administrative skills. Now Moore is one of dozens of seniors getting help through Caritas Family Solutions, the non-profit organization that was awarded the contract after a realignment in 2017.

The Senior Community Services Employment Program (SCSEP) is a major part of the Older Americans Act, and the only federal program that focuses on unemployed older adults rejoining the work force. The grant awarded to Caritas through The Center for Workforce Inclusion, covers the salary costs of over 100 participants annually, across 10 counties.

Gary Woods, SCSEP Program Manager, said program success depends on what skills the seniors bring to the table. "Our training program gives them the opportunity of working in a variety of areas ranging from janitorial to clerical and more. We don't preclude them from anything. We ask them, 'What would you like to do?'"

Moore, who serves as Lead Employment Specialist for the program, said many of the seniors come with lots of experience, but it can work against them because employers think they will have to pay them more money. "Employers don't say 'You're too old,' but you know what's going on," she said. Now Moore is utilizing her skills to assist other seniors in the very program from which she has benefited. Her employment goal is to one day run her own agency specializing in computer skills training. "You never get too old to learn," she said.
